
















Red Ribbon Week—Enjoy Life Drug Free!








Providing Awareness to Help Policy

As a prevention coalition, it our job to be the experts in substance misuse prevention. Our task is to provide real, evidenced based information to the general public and those who represent us in regards to policy and laws. We are especially proud when our RCFY Youth Action Leaders testify in the state house and are featured in the state newspaper raising awareness to issues important to them.







A teen's worry

Kaylee McGlynn, 16, a senior at Raymond High School, said edibles are popular among students at her high school "because it's super discreet." She said teenagers get them from their parents, peers and online, and eat them at school

McGlynn, who is active in the Raymond Coalition for Youth, a substance abuse prevention organization, has testified in Concord against previous bills to legalize cannabis for recreational use, and plans to do so again in the new session. "I will be continuing to battle for what we've got in our cannabis island," she said.

McGlynn, who calls herself a "science-driven person" and ar animal lover, said she worrie about young children and pets ac cidentally ingesting edibles.

"It just hurts me to see that," sh said. "It's super dangerous, and just don't feel comfortable wit the adults in this society that w have right now to handle this sit ation appropriately."

Ava Lind, 15, a student at Raymond High School, said she has seen the negative effects of social media among her classmates. The byproducts include cyber-bullying and body image issues.

"There are big celebrities out there that look a certain way ... It makes it seem like you have to have a perfect body or a perfect image to be great," she said.

"Everyone's growing up so quickly now," she said. "It's hard to slow it down." Lind said she thinks some apps

should be available only to adults. And she suggested, "Maybe you have to be over 18 to have comments on your posts, so you're lder and more mature.


